Spotted in Central Ohio: The Great Ladybug Hunt Launches

This June

Starting June 1, 2025, parks, trails, neighborhoods, and businesses across central Ohio will become home to hundreds of tiny treasures. It's not an insect invasion—but rather, a creative and joyful campaign called The Great Ladybug Hunt, launched by the Hous Foundation.

THE HOUS FOUNDATION, a local nonprofit founded in 2022 in honor of Annie Niewenhous and her children, works to remove financial barriers that prevent kids from participating in nonschool activities. From sports and art classes to music and science camps, the foundation believes these experiences provide essential life benefits—personal growth, academic achievement, health and well-being, and social connection.

This June, the foundation invites families, individuals, and community groups to join the Great Ladybug Hunt by painting rocks to resemble ladybugs and hiding them throughout their neighborhoods. More than 500 ladybug rocks are already being placed throughout central Ohio, and the event promises a fun, family-friendly way to

enjoy the outdoors while supporting a meaningful cause.

According to Sonya Thesing, Highland Lakes' resident and Executive Director of the Hous Foundation, participation is simple. "We're asking folks to paint, hide, find, and post photos of ladybug rocks," she explained. "Each time someone shares their ladybug discovery on social media with the hashtag #HousLadybugs, they'll be entered into weekly raffles." Prizes will include gift cards to local shops and restaurants, family activities, and fun kids' experiences around central Ohio.

Every rock will be marked with a QR code or the Great Ladybug Hunt webpage—www.housfoundation.org/ladybugs—which makes it easy for participants to connect, learn more, and enter the drawings.









While the hunt is sure to bring smiles and adventure to families all month long, its deeper meaning is never far from mind. Painting and hiding ladybug rocks was a beloved activity of Annie Niewenhous and her children. Now, it serves as a symbol of hope and opportunity for others.
